## Local council electoral structure review

# About Merri-bek City Council

The Traditional Custodians of the land in Merri-bek City Council are the Wurundjeri people.

Merri-bek City Council is about 4 km north of the Melbourne CBD. It covers an area of 51 km2 and in 2021 was home to 171,357 people. The population will likely exceed 250,000 by 2036, with over half of this growth expected in Brunswick, Brunswick East and Coburg, driven by higher density living. It is expected that over 50% of new households will have 2 or fewer occupants.

Significant and recent housing developments have occurred in and around the Pentridge Prison site and there will be continued growth along major transport corridors, such as Lygon Street in Brunswick and parts of Sydney Road.

The council area is heavily urbanised, with most land zoned for residential, industrial, and commercial use. About 15% of the land is open space. The Merri and Moonee Ponds creeks are significant waterways, marking the east and west boundaries respectively.

Merri-bek is culturally diverse. About 33% of residents were born outside of Australia, and 31% of households used a language other than English at home in 2021.

In 2022 the council changed its name from Moreland to Merri-bek.

#### **Current structure**

Merri-bek City Council is divided into 3 wards with a total of 11 councillors:

- 2 wards with 4 councillors each
- · one ward with 3 councillors.

#### About the review

Under Victoria's *Local Government Act* 2020, Merri-bek City Council must now have a single-councillor ward electoral structure.

The Minister for Local Government has appointed an electoral representation advisory panel to review the electoral structure of Merri-bek City Council and advise on the most appropriate single-councillor ward structure.

The panel is looking at:

- the appropriate number of councillors and wards
- the location of ward boundaries
- appropriate ward names.

Electoral structure reviews are an important part of democracy and your input is valuable. As a local, you know your council area better than anyone. This is your chance to tell the panel your thoughts about the single-councillor ward structure you believe would best provide representation for your community.

You can have your say:

- 1. in a response submission to the preliminary report
- at an online public hearing, if you ask to speak in your response submission.

#### Monday 16 and Tuesday 17 October

#### Information sessions

#### Wednesday 18 October

#### **Preliminary report**

The panel will release a preliminary report with one or more options for the electoral structure on Wednesday 18 October.

You can make a response submission from this date.

#### Wednesday 8 November

#### Response submissions

The panel must receive your submission by 5 pm on Wednesday 8 November.

The panel will not accept late submissions.

#### Tuesday 14 November

#### **Public hearing**

The panel will hold an online public hearing if anyone asks to speak about their response submission at 10 am on Tuesday 14 November.

The public hearing will not be held if no one asks to speak.

#### Wednesday 13 December

#### Final report

The panel will submit a final report to the Minister for Local Government including its advice for the electoral structure on Wednesday 13 December.

The minister will consider the panel's advice before recommending a change to the electoral structure. Any change is expected to apply at the next local council general election.

#### One vote, one value

The 'one vote, one value' democratic principle is enshrined in the *Local Government Act 2020*. This means every person's vote counts equally.


When a local council is subdivided into wards, the number of voters each councillor represents in each ward must be plus-orminus 10% of the average number of voters per councillor for all wards.

The map below includes the current number of voters in each ward and the ward's current deviation from the average. The panel will consider likely population and voter changes to ensure the structure remains equitable.

If you make a submission online, you can use a mapping tool to build your preferred electoral structure. The tool uses current voter numbers to tell you the deviations of the wards you make. This will help you propose a structure that meets the requirements of the Act.
